

Successful online students have two traits in common: they know how to stay focused on their studies and they are ready to learn. But, resolving to earn an online high school diploma isn't difficult if you know what steps to take.

- 1. Make sure that online high school is right for you. An online education isn't for everyone. If you do not enjoy working independently or get distracted easily, perhaps online education isn't the best fit. Carefully evaluate the choice to learn online. Feel free to contact QDA with any questions you may have.
- 2. Choose an online school that works for your learning style. Each online high school has a different way of interacting with students. local extracurricular QDA offers activities, and each students is assigned an online mentor (Instructional Supervisor) to work with each day. Some schools leave students to work on their own, simply sending grades and feedback through email. At QDA we offer a personalized program.
- **3.** Create a high school graduation plan with the help of a counselor. When you enroll in QDA you will be given the opportunity to create a graduation plan outlining the courses you need to take in order to earn a

diploma and talk with our academic counselor at the end of each semester to review the plan.

- **4.** Put your learning first. We encourage our students to commit to graduating and to keep this goal in mind and offer guidance to stay on track.
- **5.** Create a study spot. A clean, quiet place to complete your assignments can make a huge difference to an online student. Find a place in your home with a desk that you can use. Speak with other family members about the importance of keeping the area neat and keeping quiet while you are trying to study.
- **6.** Use a calendar and always turn assignments in on time. Having your own monthly / weekly calendar can help you schedule your assignments and plan for the future. At the beginning of each semester, write down your assignments on the appropriate days. At the beginning of each week, review what will be due in the coming days.
- 7. Ask for help when you need it. At QDA, we encourage our students to know when to speak up. If you don't understand an assignment, let someone know. Some online students may struggle learning technical subjects such as math in a virtual environment. QDA offers tutoring for students who need a little extra attention with their studies.







Special Services Report

The QDA is committed to providing support services to all students and teachers. We also provide a free and appropriate public education in the least restrictive environment to all students with disabilities. The Special Services Center monitors to (1) ensure that the special education policies and procedures are in accordance with all federal, state and local mandates, (2) design, implement and evaluate appropriate programs for students with disabilities, and (3) provide technical assistance and staff development opportunities. The QDA focuses on the consistency and quality of special education programs and related services within the district.

Each year school districts throughout Ohio participate in an effort to identify, locate, and evaluate all children with disabilities, age 3 through age 21. The QDA provides special education services to approximately 50 students with disabilities, or approximately 8% of the district's student population. If you have a child, or know of a child, you suspect may have a disability as described by the Individuals with Disabilities Education Improvement Act (IDEIA) or Americans with Disabilities Act – Section 504, please contact Mrs. Maureen Wittler, Director of Special Services at 330-339-7218.

Gap Closing



This rating shows how well all students are doing in your school in reading, math, and graduation. It answers the question – Is every student succeeding, regardless of income, race, ethnicity, or disability?







tech update

As QDA continues to expand over the State of Ohio, the technology department is committed to keeping our students connected to the latest cutting edge technology. Over the past few years, QDA has implemented numerous network infrastructure changes to improve the efficiency and reliability of our network resources:

- In the summer of 2014 our Learning
 Management System underwent a major
 upgrade to improve the performance and
 navigation of the site. Students and parents can
 now find everything they need with just a few
 clicks.
- In addition to our Learning Management System upgrade, our QDA Homepage was also updated in fall of 2013.

- These two upgrades now allow students to access QDA resources from their tablet or mobile device without any loss of quality. Our regular desktop site simply adapts to any screen size. Roughly 25% of new visitors access our site from mobile or tablet devices.
- Our Steubenville and East Liverpool offices have upgraded to fiber optics for Internet connectivity.
- Our New Philadelphia Voice-over IP System has expanded to our Steubenville and East Liverpool offices.
- New for the 2014-2015 School Year - QDA's New Philadelphia office will be expanding to offer a secondary computer lab and training center for students and staff.


